

What is aggressive behavior?

Aggressive Behavior is the official journal of the International Society for Research on Aggression. What is human aggression?

Human aggression is often defined as any proximate, intentional, and harmful behavior an individual performs in a targeted manner toward someone who is motivated to avoid the behavior (e.g., Baron and Richardson 1994; Anderson and Bushman 2002).

Is aggressive behavior a predictor of later criminality and substance use?

Additionally, proactive aggression has been shown to be a stronger predictor of later criminality and substance use in children compared to reactive aggression (e.g., Brendgen et al. 2001).

Why is aggressive behavior a product of predisposing factors?

Like other social behaviors, aggressive behavior is always a product of predisposing personal factors and precipitating situational factors. The predisposing factors exert their influence by creating encoded social cognitions including schemas about the world, scripts for social behavior, and normative beliefs about what is appropriate.

Does aggressive behavior predict adverse outcomes?

Aggression is predictive of adverse outcomes for the (a) enactor (e.g., violent recidivism), (b) those affiliated with the enactor (e.g., child abuse), (c) victims of aggressive behavior (e.g., mortality), (d) witnesses of aggressive behavior (e.g., posttraumatic stress disorder), and (e) society in general.
